Issue Background: On July 9, 1999, the federal government published a proposed procurement rule that directs contracting officers to review a firm's cimpliance with labor, tax and environmental laws when making pre-award responsibility determinations. In addition to compliance with these laws, the rule requires contractos to exhibit necessary workplace practices, including training, worker retention, and legal compliance. (See Federal Register 7/9/99 and/or ENR 7/19/99, p. 10, for further details.)

1. How would you describe your firm?
